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Granville Leo Club launches recycling drive

The Granville Jr./Sr. High School Leo Club is asking for help from the community as it works on several service projects, including a plastic collection effort that could earn a new public bench for the Granville area.

Whitehall residents voice concerns at revaluation forum

WHITEHALL – A public forum on the town's recent revaluation, which has touched off sometimes heated complaints from town residents, attempted to dispel misconceptions about the process and the results of the upgraded assessments rolls.

While organizers of the Nov. 5 forum said they thought it went well, several of those who attended the gathering in person or online were less sanguine.

Representatives of the Washington County Real Property Tax Service joined Whitehall Assessor Roberta Stone to address concerns and answer questions about the recent revision of the town's assessment rolls from roughly 50 people who turned out

SNAP cuts strain Comfort Food Community

With federal SNAP benefits suspended during the ongoing government shutdown, Comfort Food Community is preparing for an increase in residents seeking food assistance across Washington County and the surrounding region.

"We started to see an uptick, especially in numbers in the pantry, really over the month of October, even leading up to it," said Laura Marx, executive director of

Comfort Food Community. "I don't know if that was based on people wondering what was going to happen or fear about what's going on. This week in particular, I think our numbers have been a little bit higher, and I would expect that the number will continue to rise."

Marx said the organization has also been hearing from other food pantries and partner organizations. "We've seen an

its goal of 1,000 pounds within one year. If the goal is reached, the club will receive a Trex bench that will be placed somewhere in Granville. Items that can be donated include clean and dry plastic bags, pallet wrap, food storage bags, product

wrap and plastic mailers. Collection bins are located at the junior/senior high school front office, the Granville Village Municipal Building, and the Eco Cents Bottle Redemption Center at 27 West Main Street in Granville.

In addition to the NexTrex challenge, the club is collecting used eyeglasses, used hearing aids, empty prescription pill bottles with labels removed and tabs from recy-

clable cans. The glasses and hearing aids will be refurbished and distributed to people in need, the pill bottles will help carry medication in developing countries, and the tabs will be recycled to help support transportation costs for children receiving care at Shriners Hospitals.

for the session and another 50 people who watched a Facebook live stream and submitted their comments and inquiries. The gathering was the third time residents have come out to complain about the reval, with the number participating growing each time.

The session opened with Real Property Tax Service Director Miranda Bernholz giving a 25-minute presentation explaining how the reval was conducted, followed by more than 90 minutes of questions and comments from taxpayers.

A revaluation is intended to update the assessed values of all properties in the community "to reflect today's real estate market," Bernholz explained. Because the town had not conducted a reval in nearly 20 years, the differences between the assessed value and the market value of a property could in some cases be significant — resulting in a sizeable change in the assessed value, she said.

The COVID-19 pandemic, which saw people from metropolitan areas snapping up properties in Whitehall sight unseen — at prices more reflective of the real estate markets in metropolitan areas — "really impacted the prices," Bernholz said. That buying spree significantly increased the perceived market value of many properties in the community, she said.

Bernholz tried to disabuse residents of the misperception that a reval is intended to increase the amount a municipality can raise through property taxes.

"This is not about raising more money for the town," she said. A reval is intended to "redistribute the tax burden" so that property owners who have been paying less than their fair share because of an assessment based on prices from 20 years ago are now responsible for what

they should have been charged all along, while property owners with assessments based on current — and higher — market values, she said.

The revised assessments are determined through a lengthy process that involves database research, personal visits to some properties to try to ensure similar properties carry similar assessed values and a review of those revised numbers by state officials, which acts as a "quality-control step, Bernholz said.

Once the new assessments are made, property owners are contacted about the changed numbers. Anyone who believes their new assessment is incorrect has the opportunity to meet with Stone to discuss the numbers and seek a correction. If those meetings don't produce a satisfactory result, the assessment can be "grieved" — challenged before a Board of Assessment Review made up of average citizens, Bernholz explained.

The process is "structured, transparent and designed to give you a voice," Bernholz said.

Bernholz's presentation did not satisfy some of those who attended the forum.

Resident Joe Rozell repeated complaints he had previously voiced about what he saw as inconsistencies in the revised assessments, saying he had documentation that similar properties were assigned significantly different values.

"Fairness is important and I don't see any fairness here," he said.

Other speakers raised similar concerns, citing increases in the assessments on their properties that were very different than those

assigned to similar neighboring properties.

Bernholz acknowledged "it's not a perfect system" but stressed anyone who feels their properties were unfairly assessed to go through the challenge process.

Some speakers said they had attempted to follow the process Bernholz outlined but were stymied by Stone's failure to respond to telephone calls or her absence from her office during scheduled office hours. Stone said she tried to respond to all the calls she received and said she was only out of the office on one day — the day after her mother died.

Stone responded to one speaker who claimed Stone had visited her property then had done nothing further by noting she had completed the paperwork to make an assessment change, then told the woman to come in and sign it — something the woman failed to do.

Town Board member Francis Wilbur urged those at the meeting to "work with her" to address their concerns.

"Let's go through the process," Wilbur said, adding "it's got to start from you.

In all, Bernholz, Stone and RPTS assistant Lindsay Votra responded to roughly 40 questions and comments during the 90-minute session. Stone also noted that once the gathering ended, 11 of those in attendance met with her to schedule appointments to discuss possible changes in their assessments before the March 31, 2026, deadline when the assessments for the coming year are set.

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Granville observes Armistice Day, 1925

There were some news items of interest in the November 13, 1925 issue of the Granville Sentinel.



Armistice Day was observed in Granville: "The Granville Post of the American Legion and its Auxiliary carried out the Armistice day program at 12 noon Wednesday by holding services at the World War monument on the high school lawn. Rev. J. Parry Jones offered the invocation followed by an appropriate address by Rev. H.E. Kaulfuss. Rev. J.C. Simmons pronounced the invocation. Commander Morris Rote-Rosen and President Lena M.S. Brown of the Legion and Auxiliary, laid wreaths at the base of the monument while Thomas H. Roberts, jr., sounded taps on the bugle.

"The annual banquet given by the Legion Auxiliary was held at the organization rooms in the evening at 6 o'clock. The Legionnaires, with their families and parents, attended and every seat in the hall was taken. After the banquet the Auxiliary and guests marched in a body to the Pastime theater to attend the pictured 'AS No Man Hath Loved'. The invitation was extended through the courtesy of Adolph Kohn, the manager of the theater.

"The dance at the Odd Fellows hall was largely attended and thoroughly enjoyed. This was also given by the Auxiliary, Craig McHenry's orchestra furnishing the music.

"Several honorary guests attended the banquet, including Mr. Kohn."

per by the Ladies Aid society is to be held at the church parlors Friday night, November 13. All are cordially invited. The ladies are asked to bring some little gift to be placed on the table as there is to be a sale of fancy articles. Any gift will be appreciated. A good program is being prepared."



The American Legion essay contest was underway: "The prize essay contest which closes this week Friday and which is sponsored by the Granville Legion Post for Education week, is attracting some attention among the high schools who are the only ones eligible for entry. The first prize of a gold medal and the second prize of a silver medal, which are to be awarded the writers of the two best essays on 'What Constitutes Good American Citizenship', are now on exhibition in the window of N. Goldberg and Son. The award will be made at the high school auditorium Wednesday morning of next week at 9 o'clock, at which time a patriotic program will be given by the high school pupils. The winners of the essay will read their papers as a part of the program. The judges are Prof. McMaster, Dr. W.L. Munson, Mrs. Lena M.S. Brown and Irving Wynkoop. The public is invited to

attend the exercises."



A former Granville pastor was invited to a major meeting of an organization: "Rev. G.S. Beckwith, pastor of the Hudson Falls Baptist church, is passing the week at Newburgh. While there he will attend the official visitation of the Deputy Grand Commander of the State of New York, E.A. Marsh. At this meeting Dr. Beckwith will occupy the position of prelate in which capacity he served that organization for several years. Mr. Beckwith was pastor of the Granville Baptist church some years ago and was worthy patron of Sylvan Star chapter, O.E.S., for nearly two years."



A report from a more distant town: "At the election in Dolgeville last week Miss Katherine Bastedenbeck was re-elected town clerk by a majority of 558 over her opponent. Miss Bastedenbeck is a former Granville girl who has made good and her friends are proud of her success."



A football game trip: "Among the number of Granville people who motored to Hanover, N.H., Saturday to attend the Cornell-Dartmouth football game, were Mr. and Mrs. M.W. Hicks with daughters, Huldah

and Marilla and son Mansir; Mrs. Fred Potter, F.C. Sheldon, Walter Doll, C.W. Barker, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Stevens, with their houses guests, Mr. and Mrs. Stern of New York; Gurdon Stevens, Miss Alice Grace, Mr. and Mrs. James O'Brien, Charles Statia and Miss Agnes O'Brien, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Scott, John Brayton, Kenneth Murphy, James Brodie, Edward Keelon and Easton Owens."



This week's photo shows the miniature train that was a fixture of the Granville Firemen's Carnival for many years. The carnival was run by the Granville Fire Department as a joint effort of the three fire companies in the village of Granville at the time: the Henry Hose Company, the Granville Hook and Ladder Company, and the Norton Hose Company. The photo is undated, but is likely from the 1950s to 1970s. There are few details in this photo beyond the miniature train ride itself. It is unknown whether this photo was taken at the old carnival grounds on the Weinberg lot off of Quaker Street, now the site of the Granville Elementary School, or at the new carnival grounds on East Potter Avenue, where the Autumn Leaves Car Show has been held in recent years.

increase in requests generally over the past few months," she said. "We're just trying to see how we best serve the communities with the food that we have and how can we secure more food and work with our partners... right now we're just trying to figure out how we best prepare for what's coming over the next month or so."

Comfort Food Community operates food pantries in Greenwich and Cossayuna, coordinates monthly distribution events with the Regional Food Bank, and sources produce through local farms and gleaning partnerships. Its Farm-2-Library program also places refrigerators of fresh food inside public libraries, allowing residents to take what they need without eligibility paperwork. Marx said that, when SNAP benefits disappear, pantry access becomes the primary source of replacement food.

"For people who are losing SNAP benefits, I think it's really beneficial for people to visit their local pantry," she said.

Marx emphasized that the organization will continue operating with the resources and staff it has. "We have a small team here, but we're very committed and dedicated to

making sure that we fulfill our mission of making sure that people have food," she said. "It's really heartwarming to feel community support in what we're doing."

Governor Kathy Hochul recently announced \$30 million in emergency food assistance to help food programs handle expected increases in demand during the shutdown. Marx noted that the state support is a key step in keeping food on people's tables in Granville. "It doesn't replace SNAP. It's not meant to replace SNAP but it does allow us to add more food to more people," she said.

Looking ahead, Marx said the organization intends to stay present for those who need assistance. "The concern is real," she said. "There are people out there that want to help and that can help, and we will be available to get people the food that they need in the best way that we can. This is what we do, we feed people."

Residents in need of assistance can visit the Pember Library Farm-2-Library program via the Comfort Food Community, which offers free fresh food on Thursdays after 1:30 p.m. on a first come, first served basis. The Granville Area Food Pantry on 3 Morrison Ave., is open Saturdays from 9 to 10:30 a.m. and serves residents of the Granville School District once per month.

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Write-in campaign ousts Dresden Supervisor Tall, returns Ferguson to office

DRESDEN – A last-minute write-in effort – reportedly organized in part by the town’s two justices - has unseated Supervisor Charles Tall, replacing him with the man he succeeded in the office.

Tall, who was appointed supervisor after the abrupt resignation of Paul Ferguson in September 2024 to fill the remaining year of Ferguson’s term, had had no opponent on the Nov. 4 ballot. But opponents – some of them apparently driven by Tall’s effort to eliminate one of the town’s two justice positions – staged a successful effort to defeat him by writing in Ferguson’s name.

Tall received 72 votes as the only candidate on the ballot. The write-in campaign for Ferguson garnered 124 votes, according to the Washington County Board of Elections. Those numbers are unofficial until the board completes a recanvass of the results.

Tall accepted the results philosophically, saying “what happened, happened.” But he noted that “emotions in the town are running high,” as evidenced by several heated conversations that took place at a special Town Board meeting on the 2026 budget held the day after the election.

Tall noted that the write-in campaign had been organized in part by Jared and Darin Eggleston, the town’s two justices. Both men had threatened to quit their posts if Tall went through with a proposal to reduce one of the justice’s salary to just \$1 – a reduction that was approved as part of the tentative 2026 spending plan at the Nov. 5 meeting.

The Egglestons’ reported involvement in the write-in effort could be problematic for them, as the state rules governing the conduct of judicial officials prohibit justices from being involved in any political effort involving offices other than their own.

The rules state “Neither a sitting judge nor a candidate for public election to judicial office shall directly or indirectly engage in any political activity” and specifically bar “participating in any political campaign for any office” or “publicly endorsing or publicly opposing (other than

by running against) another candidate for public office.”

Tall said several complaints about have already been filed with the state Commission on Judicial Conduct. CJC public information officer Marisa E. Harrison said she could neither confirm nor deny the commission had received any complaints, noting the organization does not comment on cases involving judicial complaints until it issues a decision on any discipline it hands down.

That discipline can include admonition, censure or removal from office and a ban on holding any judicial position in the future.

Ferguson confirmed the Egglestons were among those who had approached him about the write-in campaign but noted that several other people – including several people living outside the town – had also spoken to him about the plan.

In a telephone interview late Thursday, Jared Eggleston said the brothers got involved in the write-in effort in response to public dismay over Tall’s leadership.

“A lot of people in town were very frustrated with Charles,” he said.

Eggleston said Tall pushed forward on several proposals – including his plan to reduce the justice salary to \$1 – without speaking to longtime residents or consulting with other town officials. He described Tall’s leadership style as “arrogant” and said “the guy has no ethics, no integrity” – pointing to changes made in the proposed 2026 town budget made after the election that cut the supervisor’s annual salary from \$15,000 to \$7,000, reduced the money available to the supervisor for contractual expenses by \$2,500 and cut the salary allocation for the budget officer – a role currently filled by the supervisor – from \$12,500 to \$6,000.

The changes will set Ferguson up to fail, he added.

Tall explained his rationale for the cuts at during recent discussions about the spending plan, saying the lower figures more accurately reflect the amount of work the job entails.

Eggleston noted that although Ferguson will take over town government leadership in January, the proposed budget will be in place by that point. He said he’s “not sure it’s going to help at this point” to have a

new person at the helm.

The effort to recruit Ferguson as a write-in candidate was a “collaboration” among a number of people and involved “a lot of phone calls, a lot of door-to-door,” Eggleston said.

Ferguson said he had been approached just six days before the election about a possible write-in challenge to Tall and that, after several days of deliberation, “I said – let’s do it.” He said he had not expected to win, given the difficulties of staging a write-in effort, but that “I’m just overwhelmed” by the support he received.

Ferguson also said the effort to defeat Tall had drawn support not only from town residents but from others in the county – including at least one member of the Board of Supervisors he declined to identify. That support came because of the ongoing difficulties with the 2026 county budget, which currently calls for a 17% increase in county taxes driven in large part by a huge increase in spending in the Department of Social Services, Ferguson said.

Tall is the chairman of the Board of Supervisors Health and Human Services Committee, which oversees the DSS.

Eggleston also said he and his brother are still considering whether to follow through on their threat to resign and will wait “to see what plays out” under Ferguson.

He declined to comment on any possible ramifications from the reported complaints about his involvement in the write-in campaign.

Ferguson had stepped down mid-term because of repeated clashes with members of his Town Board and acknowledged some of those who had caused him to resign remain in town government. However, he said he will do his best to work with all board members, saying “I’m in it for the people.”

He also said he hopes his election will encourage more people to attend Town Board meetings so elected officials can get a better sense of community sense on issues the town will be facing.

“I’ll have to come in and clean up the mess,” he said.

Tall’s defeat means there will be four new faces on the Board of Supervisors when it comes back into session in January.

In addition to Ferguson – who had served on the board during his previous term as supervisor – new supervisors will represent the towns of Easton, Greenwich and Putnam.

In Easton, current Town Board member William Herrick, a Republican, was unopposed to succeed fellow GOPer Dan Shaw, who did not run again, and in Greenwich, Town Board member James J. Mumby Jr., a Democrat, faced no opponent in his bid to succeed fellow Democrat James Nolan, who stepped down.

In the only on-ballot supervisor contest, the current Putnam town clerk, Republican Darlene Kerr, defeated independent candidate

Kathleen L. Coffman to succeed Republican Darrell T. Wilson, who opted not to seek re-election.

Pickering, Fonda-Fultonville roll over G-W

A glance at the stat sheet would lead someone to believe that Colin Pickering is a one-man band. Yes, the senior running back exploded for five touchdown runs, but the Fonda-Fultonville football team certainly has a plethora of weapons, and they were all on display on Friday night. It is difficult for a defense to key in on Pickering because the Valley Hawks have so many ways to hurt you.

Fonda-Fultonville blew open a close game in the second quarter and went on to roll over Granville-Whitehall 51-0 in a Section 2 Class C semifinal contest.

Fonda (10-0) advances to meet Schuylerville in the Class C championship game next Saturday at noon at Shenendehowa High School.

The Valley Hawks edged G-W 35-30 early in the season, but this game was different right from the start. G-W came into the game without Brandon Beaver, part of their 1-2 running game punch with CJ Monty and the leader of their defense. Another key player on both sides of the ball, Nathan Barber, was knocked out of the game early after being on the receiving end of a hard hit on a kick return.

"I'm very disappointed, not in the kids, but I was hoping we would get the opportunity to get to the next level. I'm disappointed for the com-

munity," G-W coach Kevin Gebo said after the game. "But at the same time, I'm very thankful that they gave me the opportunity to coach this program."

After G-W had a three-and-out on their first drive, the Valley-Hawks took over with prime field position near midfield. Fonda-Fultonville used a mix of runs and short passes to quickly navigate down the field, capping the possession with a 12-yard touchdown run by Pickering. The extra point attempt was no good, making the score 6-0.

Fonda-Fultonville began to impose its will in the second quarter, using the read option to pick apart the G-W defense. First, Pickering scored on a 32-yard scamper to increase the lead to 13-0 after the extra point kick by Sam Huckans.

Signal caller Brayden Wassink then scored on a 7-yard run to make it 20-0 Valley Hawks after the Huckans' kick. Pickering closed the first half scoring with a 21-yard TD run to give Fonda-Fultonville a 27-0 advantage at the break.

Pickering added touchdown runs of 35 and 73 yards in the third quarter. Huckans scored on a 7-yard run.

Huckans kicked a 29-yard field goal in the fourth quarter to provide the final margin of victory.

Pickering finished the contest with 261 yards on the ground.

Monty, who came into the night as the leading rusher in Section 2, was

held to 107 yards on 27 carries. It was the first game of the season where Monty didn't score a touchdown.

Despite the loss, it was a historic season for the G-W program. Gebo's squad qualified for the sectionals for the second consecutive year and advanced to the semifinals for the second year in a row. G-W also won the first-ever playoff game at Granville's Sam Eppolito Field.

"I'm very thankful. They give everything they have," Gebo added. "It's hard. The numbers slowly creep away from you with injuries. At the very beginning, one of the questions was what you are concerned about. Exactly what happened. Injuries. Concern about major key players being injured. Tonight, we were trying to figure out who to put where because we were already depleted."

Gebo will miss the talented group of seniors who placed G-W football on the map with their success over the last two seasons.

"For me, I had them as sophomores, juniors, and seniors. And for the Whitehall kids, we had them at the low levels. They're an amazing group. I was really hoping for their benefit; we could have taken it to a whole other level," Gebo said. "I really hoped this year we would win a Section Two championship. We had high expectations."

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Dresden Board passes tentative budget with 8% tax levy increase

DRESDEN – The town tax levy would increase by slightly more than \$70,000 but would still leave the town with a \$75,000 budget shortfall under a tentative 2026 budget approved by the Town Board Nov. 5.

“We have a very serious chance of running out of money” before the end of 2026, Supervisor Charles Tall told board members before they voted to approve the spending plan.

The larger levy – which represents an increase of roughly 8% – will total \$946,000, up from the current \$876,000. The higher levy comes despite a \$227,000 reduction in total town spending, from roughly \$1.7 million to about \$1.5 million.

The 8% levy increase would exceed the amount permitted under the state cap on how much a municipality can raise the levy. To create a levy higher than the cap allows, the municipality must approve a local law allowing it to go over the cap amount – a step the Town Board took before voting to advance the budget plan and after a public hearing that drew no comments from the roughly half-dozen people at the board’s Nov. 5 special meeting.

The town has been struggling with budget shortfalls since 2018, when town officials began approving budgets that drew heavily on the fund balance to avoid increasing property taxes, Tall said. That policy allowed

the town to keep the tax rate low over those years but left it with few financial reserves to deal with unexpected expenses, he noted.

The problem was exacerbated by the failure of the board to include the cost of purchasing a new truck in its spending plan, he added.

The town’s total financial reserves are expected to be about \$350,000 at the end of the current fiscal year – down from roughly \$1 million just six years ago, Tall said.

The town tax increases over the past two years have been part of Tall’s plan to regrow the fund balance.

Tall has made dealing with the town’s financial situation a priority even before he was appointed supervisor in September 2024 after then-Supervisor Paul D. Ferguson unexpectedly resigned.

The proposed 2026 budget largely kept overall town spending the same but does include raises for Town Clerk Marci Wilbur and Highway Superintendent Rick Hobus. However, the increased salaries will be largely offset by a requirement that the two begin paying a portion of the cost of their town-provided health insurance – something they had not been doing previously.

The budget plan also calls for salary cuts for two positions – supervisor and one of the two town justice posts.

Tall’s plan calls for the supervisor’s salary to be reduced from

\$15,000 to \$7,000, with an additional \$2,500 cut in the amount allocated for contractual expenses for the office. It also includes a nearly \$6,000 reduction in the one justice salary, leaving a single dollar in next year’s budget line.

The budget also calls for a reduction in the amount allocated for the budget officer’s salary – a position now filled by the supervisor – from \$12,500 a year to \$6,000 annually. Tall said the smaller salary is justified because of the “small numbers” the budget officer oversees.

The justice whose pay would be reduced under the spending plan, Jared Eggleston, said both cuts are reflective of what he called Tall’s arrogance – an attribute that played a key role in Tall’s loss in the Nov. 4.

“He wouldn’t have done that if he’d won,” Eggleston said of the supervisor salary cut in a telephone interview.

Tall was defeated by former Supervisor Paul Ferguson after several people upset with Tall’s tenure – including Eggleston – mounted a write-in campaign on Ferguson’s behalf.

Tall defended both cuts, saying the salaries for both the supervisor job and the justice position appropriately reflected the amount of work the jobs entailed.

The salary “should reflect the job that is done,” Tall said, saying he devotes an average of only about

three hours a week on town business.

The proposed reduction of the justice salary, which has been a point of contention on the Town Board since it was first proposed several months ago, prompted board member Marc Brown to vote against the spending plan.

Brown had previously argued against the cut, citing Eggleston’s two-decade service as town justice, and said Nov. 5 “I still don’t think that right.”

But fellow board member Marilyn Borden said Brown was focusing on the person being affected, rather than the best interests of the taxpayers.

“It’s not our money, it’s taxpayers’ money,” she said. “It shouldn’t be personal.”

“Hard decisions need to be made,” Borden said. “We’re trying to be fiscally responsible – and it’s painful.”

The spending plan was approved by a vote of 3-1, with Brown casting the negative vote. Board member Christine Diekel, who has also publicly opposed the justice salary reduction, was absent.

Town residents will have an opportunity to weigh in on the budget at a public hearing on the final iteration of the spending plan at 6:30 p.m. Nov. 19. The board is expected to adopt a final budget following the hearing – in time to meet the Nov. 20 state deadline for adopting a spending plan.

This was announced by Ira Pitkin, manager of the local plant. The award was made by Albert Todoroff, editor of Locker Management magazine, St. Louis, Mo., who was in Granville recently to inspect the GLF Zero Food Lockers.

In the recent election, Granville, as usual, stayed in the Republican column. Three Granville men were candidates for office, and in each case ran ahead of their ticket. Albert Berkowitz was elected to succeed himself as Special Surrogate, while Wayne Potter and James E. O'Brien, running for County Clerk and County Treasurer, respectively, were given a vote of confidence by their friends. Nearly 1900 persons

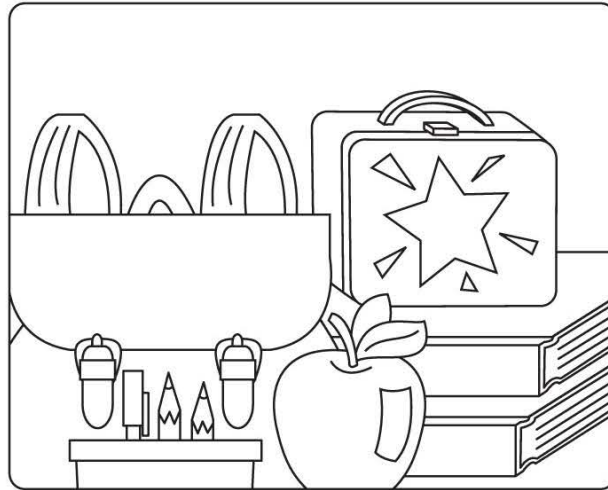

Middle Greenwich Project

The Middle Greenwich Project consists of a 235-foot-long, 10-foot-high concrete gravity spillway dam. The dam creates an impoundment that has a surface area of 9 acres at a normal surface elevation of 318 feet NGVD29. Water flows from the project impoundment to the powerhouse through a 150-foot-long concrete power canal with an upstream headgate structure containing two gates and a downstream trash rack with 1.0-inch clear bar spacing. Water then enters a single vertical turbine-generator unit with a rated capacity of 300 kW and is released from the powerhouse into a tailrace channel leading to the Batten Kill River. Interconnection to the regional electric grid is accomplished through a 0.48/4.8-kV transformer connected to a 150-foot-long transmission line.

Project recreation facilities include: (1) angler access to the reservoir and tailrace; (2) a canoe portage area at the project dam; and (3) an off-road parking area to accommodate six to eight cars.

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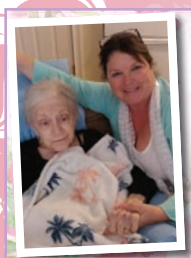
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
